• Research Scope:

The study examines financial data from USSSA tournaments held in Oklahoma, covering two major periods: 2004–2014 and 2016–2025. This analysis sheds light on the revenue structures and cash flow dynamics underlying baseball and softball events.

• Revenue Findings:

o **2004–2014**:

- Baseball tournaments generated approximately \$3.79 million.
- Softball tournaments generated about \$1.89 million, totaling roughly \$5.68 million.

Savage Park Data:

- Historical records (2004–2014) indicate \$636,000 in fees from 170 events, with an estimated income of around \$1.2 million based on gate fees.
- Recent research (circa 2020) shows over \$180,000 in fees for softball tournaments under Tulsa Little League's lease.

• Management Transitions & Organizational Dynamics:

In 2015, management of Savage Park transitioned from the Tulsa Girls Softball Association (led by Lynn Arnold) to Tulsa Little League (managed by Steve Skocik). This shift has raised questions about the relationships between these organizations, the role of the international charter in USSSA softball, and ongoing litigation issues in Florida involving Rico.

Next Steps:

Further investigation is needed to:

- o Understand the implications of the lease and management transitions.
- Clarify inter-organizational relationships, particularly regarding potential litigation and international affiliations.
- Continue monitoring financial trends across the identified periods.
