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### 1. Doctoral Project Summary

Project Title: Integrity of the Game vs. Economic Impact: The Oklahoma Model

#### Objective:

To evaluate the governance, financial transparency, and ethical integrity of youth sports operations in Oklahoma from 2001 to 2025. This project focuses on USSSA-affiliated tournaments, examining public-private partnerships, tournament finances, and municipal oversight to propose scalable reform models rooted in structured datasets.

#### Dissertation Intent:

The work synthesizes two decades of tournament data, city meeting records, personal advocacy case studies, and financial modeling. It exposes systemic weaknesses and provides replicable solutions for municipalities, tribal governments, and nonprofit stakeholders nationwide.

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### 3. Teaser Financial Insights (Hidden Valley Dataset)

Note: The figures below are derived from over 15,000 tournament records across Oklahoma (2001–2025). They are meant to raise public awareness and scholarly scrutiny of youth sports economics:

- \$24.8M+ in estimated tournament entry fees statewide (baseline analysis)
- \$0.00 reported in verifiable audits for the majority of city/tribal-operated facilities
- One tournament director averaged 47 sanctioned events per year for 8 years—without any transparent financial trail
- 600+ teams played at Firelake Ballfields in a single season, with no visible public ledger
- Gate Fee Math: 40 teams × 2 spectators/player × \$10 × 2 days = \$16,000+ in cash gate revenue per event
- Concession/Vendor Discrepancy: Many events list vendors, yet no city tax ID, license, or vendor record exists in public filings

These figures are consistent across locations and years, not outliers.

### 4. Hidden Valley Dataset Methodology Overview

A structured Excel-based dataset analyzing event finances, site oversight, and missing revenue pathways.

#### Field Logic Breakdown (Sample)

Gate Revenue	2 spectators per player × \$10 × 2 days

    - 28 teams × \$325 = \$9,100 entry revenue
    - 2 adults/player × 2 days = \$11,200 in gate
    - Total Estimated Revenue: \$20,300
