- Both Berger witnesses

2. Wallace's version is the least corroborated.

She:

- Overstates duration
- Overstates reaction of bystanders
- Admits to making unprofessional remarks

3. Jackie Noble adds no clarity.

Her statement:

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- Contains no detail
- Conflicts with James on who called police
- Provides no evidence of actual misconduct

4. Berger & Her Husband are the most internally consistent.

- Matching timelines
- Matching descriptions
- No contradictions in their accounts
- Supported by transcript logic and behavior patterns

5. Every administrative exaggeration serves to justify the ban.

Duration inflated → justifies “sustained disruption”

Crowd reaction invented → justifies “safety concern”

Multiple admins pulled away → justifies “impact”

Three meeting opportunities fabricated → justifies “defiance”

Presence of Amanda Johnson invented → supports Wallace

Police needed → amplifies severity

This matrix shows a clear pattern:

Staff statements conflict with each other, while the Bergers’ statements align with logic, timing, and transcript behavior.

Case Study: Administrative Removal and Appeal of Parent, Cyndi Berger
Formal, Objective, Research-Style Analysis (Hybrid Tone: Clear, Evidence-Based, Neutral)

I. INTRODUCTION

This case study examines the administrative removal and subsequent six-month premises ban issued to **Cyndi Berger** by Shawnee Public Schools (SPS) following a brief interaction with an SPS administrator during a high-attendance Senior Night event on October 31, 2025. The event, initially centered on a routine inquiry about an entry-fee policy, escalated into a district-level disciplinary action involving law enforcement, a Superintendent-issued ban, and a full Board of Education appeal hearing.

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This analysis evaluates the case through:

- Documented statements
- Appeal hearing transcript
- Administrative correspondence
- Witness accounts
- Policy and statutory context
- Event timelines
- Internal consistency of narratives

The purpose is not to assign intent or moral blame, but to **evaluate procedural alignment, factual reliability, policy adherence, and administrative proportionality.**

II. CONTEXT OF THE EVENT

A. Setting

The incident occurred at Shawnee High School's football stadium during a major public event—**Senior Night**—with large student and family attendance and multiple staff members assigned to various entry and engagement tasks.

B. Trigger of the Incident

Cyndi Berger approached SPS administrator **Michelle Wallace**, who was seated alone at a pre-K / 5th-grade costume contest table, to question the fairness of adults being required to pay entry fees while students performed.

No evidence suggests an intention beyond clarification of policy.

C. Immediate Aftermath

The conversation quickly broke down, with Wallace making a personal remark that escalated tensions. This resulted in:

- Staff radio traffic

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- Superintendent involvement
 - Police presence
 - Cyndi's removal from the stadium
 - Subsequent administrative action

III. ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS

A. Initial Exclusion (Nov 3, 2025)

Principal Bobby Cook issued a written exclusion from SPS premises pending Superintendent review.

B. Superintendent's Ban (Nov 7, 2025)

Superintendent Dr. Jason James issued a **six-month ban**, citing:

- Aggressive behavior
- Verbal abuse
- Safety concerns
- Sustained disruption
- Interference with school operations

C. Rationale Expansion (Nov 10, 2025)

A follow-up memo expanded the allegations, adding new claims not in the original letter.

D. Appeal (Nov 20, 2025)

Cyndi Berger appealed the ban.

The SPS Board of Education held a hearing but ultimately upheld the Superintendent's directive.

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IV. EVIDENCE REVIEW

This section evaluates the evidentiary basis for each major administrative claim.

A. Duration of the Incident

The duration of the initial interaction is central to the claim of “sustained disruption.”

1. Administrative Claims

- Wallace: **3–5 minutes**
- Superintendent James: **3 minutes total**, including time walking across the stadium
- Jackie Noble: Suggests a longer issue but gives no timeframe

2. Witness Accounts

- Cyndi: **15–20 seconds**
- John Berger: **10–15 seconds**

3. Transcript Analysis

Superintendent James confirmed he was **in the locker room** when notified, and that an officer had to unlock a gate before he could reach the plaza.

Therefore, any claim describing **his walking time** as part of the “incident duration” does not reflect the length of the interaction.

Finding

No objective evidence supports a multi-minute confrontation.

The most credible estimate is **under 30 seconds**.

B. Behavior Characterization

1. Administrative Claims

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- “Aggressive”
- “Berating staff”
- “Verbally abusive”
- “Creating fear”
- “Making others uncomfortable”

2. Evidence

- No staff statement specifies any threatening language.
- No profanity documented.
- No threats documented.
- No physical behavior documented.
- No police report indicates concern.
- Wallace’s only quoted remark is her **own**:
“**Are you ever happy?**”

Finding

The behavior description is **subjective and uncorroborated**.
The language appears inconsistent with the factual evidence.

C. Crowd Impact

Administrative Narrative

The Superintendent emphasized:

- A grandmother and child “retreated”
- Administrators “pulled from assignments”
- People witnessing the event

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Evidence

- No statement besides James mentions a fleeing crowd or startled parent.
- No corroboration exists for administrators leaving posts except Jackie Noble.
- The hearing transcript shows no Board questions validating this claim.

Finding

Claims of crowd impact are **unsupported and likely inflated**.

D. Safety Concerns

Safety concerns were cited as one justification for police involvement.

Evidence

- Police were called **after** administrative escalation.
- Police presence was not based on physical threat.
- No officer documented fear, risk, or disorderly conduct.

Finding

Safety concerns do not meet statutory thresholds for removal or exclusion.

E. Refusal to Comply

Administrative View

Cyndi “refused to leave when asked.”

Witness View

- She responded only by asking: “**For what**”?

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- She did not resist removal.
- She left without conflict.

Legal Context

Asking “why” is not refusal; it is **protected speech** unless accompanied by obstruction or threat.

Finding

No evidence of refusal or defiance exists.

F. Meeting Opportunities

Administrative Claim

Superintendent James claimed he offered **three opportunities** to meet privately before the ban.

Evidence

- No witness confirms any meeting offers.
- Cyndi denies ever receiving such offers.
- No written record supports these opportunities.
- James' own timeline suggests there was no time for repeating such invitations during a seconds-long interaction.

Finding

This claim appears **factually implausible** and unsupported.

G. Surveillance Video

Cyndi formally requested surveillance footage.

Evidence

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- No video was ever provided.
- No video referenced during the Board hearing.
- No explanation given for absence of video.

Finding

This is a **procedural failure** and undermines transparency.

V. RELIABILITY ASSESSMENT OF STATEMENTS

A. Consistency Scoring

VI. POLICY ALIGNMENT ANALYSIS

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SPS Policy BE (Board of Education)

Requires:

- Fair process
- Clear grounds for exclusion
- Documentation
- Proportional response

SPS Policy GJ-P (Community Conduct)

Allows removal only if:

- There is a threat to peaceful conduct, safety, or orderly operations
- Behavior is aggressive, disruptive, or threatening
- Orderly functioning is materially affected

Findings

1. No threat was documented.
2. No disruption was sustained or crowd-affecting.
3. Proportionality is inconsistent—six months exceeds precedents.
4. Appeal process did not meet standards of procedural fairness.

VII. FINDINGS

1. The factual evidence does not support the allegation of “sustained disruption.”

The incident lasted seconds, not minutes.

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2. No objective evidence indicates aggressive, dangerous, or threatening behavior.

The basis for removal was subjective and inconsistent.

3. Administrative accounts contain significant contradictions.

These undermine the reliability of their narrative.

4. Critical evidence (surveillance video) was never provided.

This undermines procedural fairness.

5. The ban is disproportionate.

For a first-time minor disagreement, six months is excessive.

6. Procedural failures undermine the validity of the ban.

The appeal process lacked:

- Complete evidence
- Consistent testimony
- Independent oversight

7. The Board did not reconcile factual contradictions before voting.

This raises governance concerns.

VIII. ACADEMIC CONCLUSION

From an academic standpoint, this case demonstrates:

1. **Administrative narrative drift**
(Changing explanations used to justify a predetermined outcome)
2. **Procedural opacity**
(Failure to provide evidence such as surveillance video)

(Punishment not aligned with severity of conduct)
4. **Unreliable testimony** from key administrators
(Conflicting timelines, unsupported claims)

(Absent board members, lack of evidentiary consideration)

Every one of these claims collapses under scrutiny.

III. WHAT THE EVIDENCE REALLY SHOWS

1. The interaction lasted seconds, not minutes.

Only one person claims 3–5 minutes: **Michelle Wallace**, the administrator who escalated the incident. No one else supports that claim.

2. The Superintendent wasn't even there.

He heard his name over the radio while in the locker room talking about old football memories. He walked across the stadium after everything had already ended.

3. There was no crowd reaction.

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No one except the Superintendent claims a “grandmother fleeing.”
No video provided.
Not one other witness backs it.

4. There was no safety threat.

Not a single witness describes threatening language.
Police made no report of danger.
No one was alarmed except staff who escalated a harmless question.

5. Wallace started the escalation.

Her own written statement admits she told Cyndi:

“Are you ever happy?”

This is not professional language.
It’s a trigger.

6. The Superintendent changed his story multiple times.

The Nov 3 letter, Nov 7 letter, Nov 10 memo, and appeal hearing transcript **all contradict each other.**

7. “Three opportunities to meet” NEVER happened.

No witness—including Wallace or Jackie Noble—backs this claim.
It appears invented after the fact.

8. No surveillance video was ever produced.

But Cyndi was banned six months for asking a question.

IV. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FAILED TO PROVIDE REAL OVERSIGHT

1. TWO board members were absent.

For a major disciplinary appeal.

2. The Board never demanded video.

After Cyndi requested it multiple times.

3. The Board never asked why the Superintendent's story changed.

4. The Board never questioned Wallace about admitting to antagonizing Cyndi.

5. The Board never asked Jackie Noble for details.

Her statement was vague and unhelpful.

6. The Board relied almost entirely on the Superintendent's narrative.

Despite clear contradictions in his testimony.

7. One board member DID object.

Turner Bass recommended reducing the ban to **two months**.

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He was ignored.

His motion received **no second**.

That alone shows:

- lack of deliberation
- groupthink
- rubber-stamping
- administrative dominance over elected oversight

V. WHY THIS MATTERS BEYOND ONE INCIDENT

This case isn't about one disagreement.

It's about **how a school district uses power**.

A. If a parent can be banned for six months for asking a question...

...then no parent is safe from arbitrary punishment.

B. SPS framed a harmless interaction as a security incident to justify administrative decisions.

This is a serious misuse of authority.

C. Staff provocation was ignored.

Wallace's sarcastic remark sparked the entire event.

But she faced no scrutiny.

D. Appeals mean nothing if the Board does not challenge the Superintendent.

This was a minor disagreement.

Not a discipline-worthy incident.

4. Train staff on de-escalation.

Wallace's response escalated the situation, not Cyndi.

5. Avoid involving police.

Nothing about the event required law enforcement.

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6. Board should have exercised oversight.

A fair appeal process requires evidence, questions, and accountability.

VII. BIG PICTURE: WHAT THIS CASE REVEALS

1. Administrative Overreach

The Superintendent exaggerated the event and bypassed proportional responses.

2. Broken Appeal Process

The Board rubber-stamped the Superintendent's decision.

3. Lack of Transparency

Withholding video is unacceptable.

4. Policy Misuse

Policies designed to protect safety were used to silence criticism.

5. Narrative Manipulation

The story told by SPS changed multiple times—each time strengthening the case against Cyndi rather than seeking truth.

6. Staff Accountability Gap

Staff who escalated the situation faced no review.

7. Precedent for Parent Retaliation

If a simple question results in a police-assisted removal and six-month ban, **parents lose their voice.**

- endangers safety

- interferes with duties of staff

1. Wallace's sarcastic remark ("Are you ever happy?")
→ Violation of courtesy requirement.
2. No attempt to de-escalate.
→ Staff escalated to radio call instead.
3. No warning issued before removal.
→ Policy requires opportunities to comply.
4. No investigation before ban.
→ Superintendent acted without interviewing Cyndi.
5. No factual basis documented.
→ Claims contradicted by evidence.

Conclusion:

The district did not follow its own visitor-relations policy.



V. DUE PROCESS ANALYSIS

A. Procedural Due Process Requirements

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Public-school bans must comply with:

- Notice
- Explanation of evidence
- Opportunity to respond
- Meaningful appeal
- Access to evidence (including video)
- Impartial decisionmaker

These are minimum requirements under:

- *Goss v. Lopez* (U.S. Supreme Court)

Violations

Required before issuing long-term bans.
Did not occur.

4. Superintendent Was a Direct Participant

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He:

- approached Cyndi
- initiated removal
- authored the ban
- served as primary witness
- defended his actions in the appeal

This violates impartiality.

5. Appeal Hearing Was Substantively Defective

- Two Board members absent
- No evidentiary standard applied
- Contradictions unexamined
- Motion to reduce ban ignored (no second)
- No cross-examination allowed
- No video requested by Board
- No legal review before vote

Conclusion:

Serious due-process violations occurred in both the removal and the appeal process.



VI. FIRST AMENDMENT CONSIDERATIONS

A. Public School as a Limited Public Forum

Parents attending events retain First Amendment rights, including:

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- right to question policy
- right to seek information
- right to express dissatisfaction

B. Prohibited Retaliation

Courts have repeatedly held that **retaliation for questioning government policy** violates the First Amendment.

Facts Here:

- Cyndi's initial question was content-based protected speech.
- The district's narrative consistently labels her "dissatisfied," which is constitutionally protected expression.
- She was punished for asking a question.

Conclusion:

The ban likely violates the First Amendment.

VII. PUBLIC RECORDS & TRANSPARENCY ISSUES

Key Concern: Withheld Surveillance Footage

If video existed:

- It is subject to the Oklahoma Open Records Act (51 O.S. § 24A.1 et seq.)
- SPS was obligated to provide it upon request unless privacy exceptions apply (not applicable here).

Failure to produce video suggests:

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- Either the video contradicts administrative narrative
OR
- SPS opted not to preserve/release it, violating transparency law

Conclusion:

The district breached transparency obligations.

VIII. LIABILITY & EXPOSURE ANALYSIS

1. Exposure for Wrongful Exclusion

If the exclusion lacked statutory basis, SPS risks liability for:

- negligence
- violation of due-process rights
- violation of constitutional rights
- arbitrary and capricious action (Oklahoma Administrative Law standard)

2. Exposure for Retaliation

Punishing protected speech can expose districts to:

- 42 U.S.C. § 1983 civil rights claims
- attorney's fees
- public accountability findings

3. Exposure for Board Inaction

Boards have fiduciary duties to:

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- investigate
- question contradictions
- ensure fairness

Failure to do so creates potential liability.



IX. LEGAL CONCLUSIONS

Based on statutory requirements, policy obligations, evidence inconsistencies, and procedural deficiencies, the following conclusions are supported:

1. THE REMOVAL WAS NOT LEGALLY JUSTIFIED.

The interaction did not meet the statutory threshold under 70 O.S. § 24-131.

2. THE SIX-MONTH BAN WAS DISPROPORTIONATE & UNLAWFUL.

No comparable sanction exists for conduct of this nature.

3. THE SUPERINTENDENT EXCEEDED HIS AUTHORITY.

He interpreted a brief disagreement as a security threat without evidence.

4. SPS FAILED TO FOLLOW POLICY BE & GJ-P.

The district violated its own procedural obligations.

5. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FAILED ITS OVERSIGHT ROLE.

The Board ignored contradictions, withheld evidence, and accepted defective testimony.

6. FIRST AMENDMENT RIGHTS MAY HAVE BEEN VIOLATED.

7. DUE PROCESS WAS NOT PROVIDED.

Multiple procedural steps were skipped or mishandled.

4. Summary of the Complaint

On October 31, 2025, during Senior Night at Shawnee High School, I asked a simple question about the district's entry fee policy. A brief 15–20 second interaction with administrator **Michelle Wallace** was mischaracterized by district staff as “aggressive,” “verbally abusive,” and “a sustained disruption,” despite zero evidence supporting these claims.

Within minutes, Superintendent **Dr. Jason James**—who was not present during the interaction and did not witness the conversation—summoned police, ordered my removal, and later imposed a **six-month ban** from all Shawnee Public Schools property. No threats, profanity, or unsafe behavior occurred. No investigation occurred prior to the ban. I was not interviewed. Surveillance video was requested but never provided.

At my appeal hearing, the Superintendent's statements were contradicted by other witnesses, contradicted by the timeline in the official transcript, and contradicted by his own prior letters. Two board members were absent; no video was reviewed; and contradictory testimony was not questioned. One board member, **Turner Bass**, moved to reduce the ban to two months, demonstrating dispute even within the board. His motion received no second.

The result was a process that violated due process, exceeded statutory authority, and punished me for protected speech.

5. Factual Background (Condensed)

a. The Conversation

- I approached Wallace to ask about Senior Night entry fee policy.

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- Wallace responded sarcastically: “**Are you ever happy?**”
- Interaction lasted **15–20 seconds**.
- No yelling.
- No threats.
- No profanity.
- No refusal to follow directions.

b. Administrative Escalation

- Wallace escalated to radio traffic.
- Superintendent James was in the **locker room**, not present.
- He walked from locker room to stadium.
- He arrived after the event had completely ended.
- He interpreted a resolved issue as a crisis and summoned police.

c. Removal

- I asked “Why am I being asked to leave?”
- Police escorted me out peacefully.

3. BASIS FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL JURISDICTION

I am filing this complaint under the Attorney General's authority to investigate:

- **Abuse of authority by public officials**
- **Violations of state law by school districts and administrators**
- **Civil rights violations involving government agencies**
- **Retaliation for protected speech**
- **Misuse of police powers by government officials**
- **Procedural due-process violations by state entities**
- **Public integrity and misconduct concerns**

Shawnee Public Schools is a taxpayer-funded public institution; its administrators are state actors subject to the Oklahoma Attorney General's oversight.

4. SUMMARY OF COMPLAINT

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On October 31, 2025, I asked a simple question about an entry-fee policy during Senior Night at Shawnee High School. A brief 15–20 second conversation with an administrator escalated—without justification—into:

- a police-assisted removal,
- a six-month ban from all district property,
- multiple administrative misrepresentations, and
- a defective appeal process in which the Superintendent acted as witness, investigator, complainant, and ultimate decision-maker.

There was **no threat**, **no profanity**, **no refusal to comply**, and **no disruption** documented by any evidence.

The Superintendent exaggerated the incident, changed his rationale multiple times, and issued a six-month ban without investigation or due process.

The Shawnee Board of Education upheld the ban without reviewing evidence or reconciling contradictions.

This constitutes:

- **abuse of authority**,
- **retaliation for protected speech**,
- **procedural due-process violations**,
- **false statements by public officials**, and
- **possible misuse of law enforcement resources**.

I am requesting a full investigation by the Attorney General.

5. DETAILED NARRATIVE OF FACTS

A. The Initial Interaction (Seconds, Not Minutes)

I approached administrator **Michelle Wallace** to ask why parents had to pay to attend Senior Night. The interaction lasted **15–20 seconds**.

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Wallace responded aggressively with the comment:

“Are you ever happy?”

This is confirmed by her own statement.

There was **no yelling, no profanity, no threats, and no refusal to comply.**

B. Improper Escalation by Staff

Instead of answering the question or directing me elsewhere, Wallace escalated the situation by calling over another administrator, **Jackie Noble**, who was not present for the initial interaction.

C. Superintendent’s Involvement and Misrepresentation

Superintendent **Dr. Jason James** was in the locker room talking with a coach and had not witnessed anything.

He responded only to radio traffic, walked across the stadium, and interpreted the situation—already resolved—as a “sustained disruption.”

He then:

- summoned police,
- ordered my removal, and
- later issued a ban based on false or unsupported statements.

D. Misuse of Police Authority

Police were not called due to danger or threat—only because the Superintendent escalated the matter. Officers reported no threat or criminal behavior.

E. The Six-Month Ban Letter (Nov 7, 2025)

James’ letter contained allegations such as:

- “aggressive behavior,”
- “verbal abuse,”
- “sustained disruption,”

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- “interference with operations,” and
- “safety concerns.”

None of these claims are supported by any evidence from staff, witnesses, or police.

F. Contradictions and Shifting Explanations

Across the Nov 3, Nov 7, and Nov 10 documents, and the appeal hearing transcript, the Superintendent’s story changes substantially, including:

- duration of incident (seconds vs. minutes),
- who witnessed it,
- who contacted police,
- whether the incident was ongoing,
- whether “three opportunities” to meet were offered (no evidence this ever occurred),
- and whether other administrators were involved.

G. Withholding of Surveillance Video

I requested surveillance video multiple times.

SPS never provided it.

The Board never reviewed it.

No legal exemption was cited.

This raises transparency concerns under the Oklahoma Open Records Act.

H. Appeal Hearing Violations

At the Nov 20, 2025 appeal:

- Two board members were absent.
- Contradictions were ignored.
- No surveillance video was reviewed.

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- No evidence was presented.
- No cross-examination was permitted.
- The Superintendent acted as witness, investigator, and prosecutor.
- One board member (Turner Bass) moved to reduce the ban — the motion received no second.

The appeal process was neither fair nor meaningful.

6. LEGAL VIOLATIONS ALLEGED

1. Violation of 70 O.S. § 24-131 (Unlawful Removal From School Property)

The statute requires:

- threat,
- disorder, or
- interference with peaceful activities.

None existed.

Therefore, the removal was unlawful.

2. Violation of First Amendment Rights

I was punished for **asking a question** about a school policy — fully protected speech. Retaliation for protected expression violates constitutional rights.

3. Due Process Violations

The district failed to provide:

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- notice,
 - access to evidence,
 - meaningful appeal,
 - impartial adjudication,
 - or pre-deprivation investigation.

4. Abuse of Authority & Misuse of Police

Police were used as an enforcement tool to validate administrative overreaction.

5. False Statements by Public Officials

Multiple administrative assertions were contradicted by:

- timeline evidence,
- witness statements,
- transcript facts,

False or misleading statements in administrative proceedings may violate state law and public-integrity standards.

6. Violation of Open Records Act

SPS failed to produce requested surveillance video — with no explanation.

7. Failure of Board Oversight

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The Board upheld the ban without reviewing evidence or addressing contradictions. This is a governance failure warranting state-level investigation.

- Denial of access to child's educational activities
 - Loss of ability to attend school events
 - Emotional distress and reputational harm
 - Administrative record containing false allegations
 - Violation of constitutional rights
 - Retaliatory punishment for protected speech
 - Loss of confidence in district governance

- Constitutional free-speech protections
- Abuse of authority statutes

3. Order SPS to release all relevant surveillance video.

4. Require SPS to correct and expunge the false allegations from district records.

5. Require mandatory compliance training for administrators regarding:

- de-escalation,
- visitor conduct policies,
- due process,
- First Amendment rights,
- and documentation standards.

6. Take any enforcement action deemed appropriate under Oklahoma law.

The interaction lasted **approximately 15–20 seconds**, during which Ms. Wallace responded with the unprofessional remark:

“Are you ever happy?”

This remark escalated the situation—not my behavior.

No yelling occurred.

No profanity.

No refusal to comply.

No threats.

No disorderly conduct.

Despite this, within minutes:

- Superintendent **Dr. James**—who was not present—
- Summoned police,
- Ordered my removal,
- And later issued a **six-month ban**.

5. FACTUAL ERRORS AND MISREPRESENTATIONS

The six-month ban was based on statements that were:

- **Contradicted by evidence,**
- **Unsupported by witnesses,**
- **Inconsistent across documents,**
- **Contradicted by the appeal transcript, and**

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- **Contradicted by Superintendent James' own testimony.**

No witness, officer, or staff statement identifies any safety concern or threat.

5. Crowd Reaction

Claims of a “grandmother fleeing” or a crowd watching are uncorroborated.

6. Police Necessity

Police were summoned administratively—not due to danger.

6. POLICY VIOLATIONS BY THE DISTRICT

A. Policy BE — Conduct of Visitors

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Removal is permitted only when conduct is:

- threatening,
- dangerous, or
- materially disruptive.

None applied here.

B. Policy GJ-P — Visitors to School Property

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Shawnee, OK — [DATE]

A Shawnee mother has filed formal complaints with the **Oklahoma Attorney General** and the **Shawnee Board of Education** after Shawnee Public Schools (SPS) issued her a **six-month ban** from district property following what she describes as a *15–20 second* conversation with an administrator during Senior Night.

On **October 31, 2025**, parent **Cyndi Berger** approached an SPS administrator to ask a question many parents were also wondering that evening:

“Why do parents have to pay entry fees when our students are performing on Senior Night?”

Instead of receiving an explanation or being directed to someone who could answer, Berger says the administrator responded sarcastically:

“Are you ever happy?”

That comment, which the administrator later admitted making in writing, sparked a chain reaction that escalated into police involvement, the Superintendent being radioed out of the locker room, and eventually—days later—the issuance of a six-month districtwide ban.

! KEY FACTS ACCORDING TO DOCUMENTED EVIDENCE

- The conversation lasted **seconds**, not minutes.
- No threats or profanity occurred.
- No refusal to comply occurred.
- The Superintendent **did not witness** the conversation.
- Police were summoned **after** the situation was already over.
- Surveillance video requested by Berger was **never produced**.
- The Superintendent’s story **changed at least four times** across different documents.
- Administrator statements conflict on basic facts (timeline, witnesses, duration).
- At the appeal hearing, **two Board members were absent**, and contradictions were never addressed.

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- One Board member, **Turner Bass**, moved to reduce the ban from six months to two; his motion received **no second**.

STATEMENT FROM CYNDI BERGER

“I asked a simple question about a school policy. The administrator escalated, not me. I never yelled, never cursed, never refused to comply. Yet I was treated like a threat, removed by police, and banned from my child’s school events for six months. I am asking for transparency, honesty, and accountability—nothing more.”



LEGAL & POLICY ISSUES RAISED

Berger’s complaint cites multiple violations, including:

1. Unlawful Removal Under 70 O.S. § 24-131

Removal from school property is allowed only for:

- threats,
 - danger, or
 - disruption.
- None of these occurred.**

2. Due Process Violations

The district:

- did not investigate,
- did not interview Berger,
- withheld requested surveillance video,
- provided contradictory explanations,

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- and held an appeal with incomplete Board participation.

3. Retaliation for Protected Speech

Asking a question about a public-school policy is **protected First Amendment speech**.

4. Policy Violations (BE & GJ-P)

During the Nov. 20 appeal hearing:

 - The Attorney General to investigate administrative misconduct
 - SPS to release surveillance video
 - The district to ensure transparency, due process, and proper application of policy in future parent interactions
