Interpretation: Pages 1-2 are the conservative direct view of records listing The Battlefields alone. Page 3 captures event records in which The Battlefields appears with other facilities. Page 4 combines both populations into the broadest documented activity footprint. Multi-facility totals establish association, not allocation.

Direct / Stand-Alone Activity

The report identifies **\$196,236 in Calculated Team Entry Fees** for stand-alone records at The Battlefields, all classified as baseball. Those records include **911 teams**, at least **2,243 games**, and at least **4,278 officials assigned**. The direct population is concentrated in **Oklahoma City** and one county. Six tournament directors appear in the direct records: Rick Glasser (\$83.35K), Bryan Pride (\$71.52K), Wade Johns (\$21.85K), Kyle Baker (\$9.9K), Matt Purser (\$9.2K), and Lisa Rangel (\$420). These amounts are calculated activity associated with records under each director and are not evidence of personal income or receipt.

The highest displayed direct season is **2019 at \$37.30K**, followed by 2021 (\$35.48K) and 2020 (\$33.22K). The annual charts show no softball Calculated Team Entry Fee activity. The report also displays **0 league teams and \$0 league Calculated Team Entry Fees** for the direct population.

Associated Multi-Facility / Satellite Activity

Excluding stand-alone records, the report identifies **\$437,043** in baseball Calculated Team Entry Fee activity associated with multi-facility event records that included The Battlefields. This population contains **1,459 teams**, at least **4,474 games**, at least **8,800 officials**, **36 facility configurations**, **28 municipality configurations**, **7 counties**, and **3 directors**. Director-associated concentrations are Rick Glasser (\$407.19K), Bryan Pride (\$21.84K), and Matt Purser (\$8.01K).

Association is not allocation. Each combination amount is one pool of calculated event activity associated with the listed facility configuration. The report does not establish how teams, games, officials, fees, or other activity were divided among the individual locations.

Combined Documented Activity Footprint

Combining direct and associated multi-facility populations produces a documented footprint of **\$633,279 in Calculated Team Entry Fees**, all baseball, involving **2,370 teams**, at least **6,717 games**, and at least **13,078 officials**. The combined view spans **37 facility configurations**, **29 municipality configurations**, **7 counties**, and **6 directors**. The largest director-associated concentration is Rick Glasser at approximately **\$490.55K**, followed by Bryan Pride at **\$93.36K**. Oklahoma City represents the \$196.24K direct municipal concentration; additional combined municipality configurations reflect the multi-site event footprint.

Facility History & Current Context

The supplied facility history places The Battlefields at **6011 S Anderson Rd, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma**. It describes earlier use as a youth-development and tournament site, including an EOC Baseball Academy era, a later period associated with The Armory, and a revitalization by The Battery OKC beginning in late 2025/early 2026. The history describes renovation of the outdoor fields, improved infield dirt and grass surfaces, functional field lighting, covered spectator seating, Wi-Fi, and access to indoor batting cages and hitting tunnels.

Methodology, Limitations & Evidentiary Caution

Calculated Team Entry Fees are derived from **Number of Participating Teams x Publicly Posted Team Entry Fee** at the event-record level and then aggregated for analysis. They are a research measure of documented economic activity, not verified collections, gross receipts, facility revenue, municipal revenue, director compensation, profit, taxable income, gate receipts, concession revenue, or the disposition of funds. Historical public records may contain incomplete information, naming variations, reused identifiers, facility-name changes, zero-dollar listings, missing fields, or later changes. The Hidden Valley dataset is an independent research reconstruction and is not an official USSSA or governmental accounting system.

Facility-Specific Synthesis

The Battlefields shows a substantial documented baseball footprint in the research period: **\$196,236** in direct stand-alone Calculated Team Entry Fees and **\$437,043** in additional activity associated with multi-facility records, for a combined footprint of **\$633,279**. The direct record population is entirely Oklahoma City-based, involves six directors, and peaks in the 2019 season. The broader event network links The Battlefields with numerous facilities and municipality combinations across seven counties. The figures demonstrate scale, participation, geographic reach, and event association; they do not establish allocation of multi-site activity or who ultimately collected, retained, distributed, or benefited financially from the calculated amounts.
